his is a special month for the Cone-I jo Valley Bonsai Society: our de-

ferred 18th Annual Bonsai Exhibition has arrived! Just check out pages 4 - 13 in this issue of our newsletter.

As you know, due to Covid-19, we were not able to hold our annual exhibition at our normal venue, the Gardens of the World in Thousand Oaks. So, our newsletter editor, David Whiteside organized this virtual exhibition. Members took pictures of their best bonsai and sent the photos to him for display in

this, the November 2021 newsletter. Enjoy this issue of the newsletter as it includes many of your trees.

David reports that 11 CVBS members participated in this year's exhibition, contributing a total of 28 bonsai. Please see page 4 for details.

Don't let this discourage you if you spot some flaws in your displayed bonsai-just use the knowledge to improve. Meanwhile, thank you very much for your participation and please enjoy!

We now are awaiting their confirmation. As soon as they confirm, we will be able to get back to holding our monthly meetings at the Community Center, our normal venue in the past. This is all provided Los Angeles County does not come up with any further Covid restrictions. Hopefully, we will be able to firm up our plans in time for the December issue of this newsletter.

Turning to house keeping: we hold our annual election of officers in No-

lt's November: What To Do with Your Bonsai?

Editor's Note: While the Conejo Valley Bonsai Society's monthly meetings remain suspended due to the coronavirus pandemic, our trees still need attention. We will continue to publish Barrett's Bonsai Tips for the duration.

Tovember can be a frustrating month for hobbyists as well as for our trees. Most trees will continue to grow as long as the weather stays balmy with warm nights (above 45 degrees F).

So what to do? If the weather stays warm, we can still repot (pot-to-pot) black pines and most junipers. It would be better to wait until spring, but if you can't


and have been waiting for cooler weather, it can be done now using common sense with regard to soil and

If your maple leaves are still relatively fresh, they might give you some fall color. If the leaves are tired and worn out, think about removing them. Make sure they are destroyed and not left on branches or soil surfaces of the bonsai. If you are planning to remove the leaves, then spend some time pruning your unwanted twigs, branches. and deadwood.


Check all wire on your trees this month and remove it if it was applied last spring or if it is beginning to scar the bark.

Black pines should have had their fall candle and branch pruning by now, but if it was not done last month ahead and do it this month.

Watch



This month is a good time to restyle junipers and black pines. They will develop their foliage mass quicker in the spring.

18th Annual CVBS Exhibition (Virtual)

The Conejo Valley Bonsai Society's 18th Annual Exhibition is an unqualified success. Nearly a dozen club members are participating in this month's virtual event, showing a full 28 bonsai—a record high number of entries. And the show includes a good variety of species with no one dominating the event.

As you know, this year, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, we could not do a live, in-person annual exhibition at our usual venue, Gardens of the World in Thousand Oaks. Instead, for the second year in a row, we are doing it as a virtual event in this newsletter (see pages 4-13).


Participation is widespread with all four officers contributing along with other board members and club members. Most of our members live in the local area, so all but one of the exhibited bonsai are from Southern California, but former vice president and lifetime member Ann Lofquist sent a photo from her home in New England.

As has been the case in past CVBS exhibitions, junipers are the most popular with four in the show. But they represent at least three species or subspecies: shimpaku, foemina, and procumbens "nana" junipers.

In addition, there are three specimens of four other species of tree: pomegranate, olive, boxwood, and elm. There are two types of boxwood: Japanese and Kingsville. And two varieties of elm, including one Catlin elm.

There also are two willow leaf figs. And one each of 10 species: maple, silverberry, dwarf jade, Korean hornbeam, cork oak, rosemary, hackberry, gingko, Indian hawthorn, and bougainvillea. Most of the trees shown here and on the following pages are evergreen or still in their summer foliage, but there is one in full fall color—the maple on the next page. And there are three trees showing their winter silhouettes.

Please join me in thanking all of the 18th Annual Exhibition (Virtual) participants. And enjoy the show.








