Following our very successful April meeting, a workshop, we are planning more meetings like it for the remainder of 2022 (see Program Schedule, page 2). Members are invited to bring trees to work on. Club advisor Ken Fuentes will be available for anyone wanting help. We are holding a few slots open for possible demonstrations depending on the Covid situation.

In a new practice, we wil begin each monthly meeting with a 5- to 10-minute talk on various bonsai topics. We will start the program at our May meeting with Ken Martin discussing fertilizers, so bring your questions on fertilizers to the meeting. Ken will be asking for contributions from the floor, so please come prepared to talk about any nutrition secrets or hints have you picked up while working with your trees.

Barrett's Bonsai Tips

Some May Flowers Should Be Gone by Now


S atsuki azaleas should be nearly through blooming this month. If your azalea has an established shape, now is a good time to clean out extra and unwanted growth. Trim for form and style.

Make sure all seed pods are removed as soon as possible. Leaving the seed pods to mature tends to weaken the tree and new growth is likely to be weak. Repotting of azaleas can be done now. It might be wise to wait to move your azaleas from nursery containers to bonsai pots until next spring.

Pomegranates and olives may be potted from nursery containers to bonsai pots during June and early July. Protect any newly potted plants from direct sun for a week or so. Black pines should have had their candles pruned by the end of this month and certainly by the middle of July.

Deciduous trees such as elms, Japanese and trident maples, liquidambars, etc. should have slowed down by now. Trim all new twigs to one or two sets of leaves. Pay attention to the way new buds point and trim for direction. Established bonsai should be developing the ramification needed to create the illusion of a mature tree. Remember that most deciduous trees in nature develop soft outlines and rounded apexes. Trim accordingly.

Fertilize trees that develop flower buds in early summer, such as crab apple, quince, ume (Japanese apricot), and

wisteria with a low nitrogen, rich phosphate fertilizer. Repeat throughout the summer at least two more times.

Powdery mildew is already showing up on maples, crapemyrtle, and quince. Spray with Benomyl or a good fungicide that is recommended for mildew.

Pine tip moth has been active again. The grub eats the center of new pine candles. If your black pine candles turn brown at the very tip, chances are that pine tip moth grubs are active. Pick off the brown end and inspect the inside. You should find the grub, a pupae, or the pupae case. Destroy

the critter and dispose of the candle tip. Since this

grub lives inside the candle, only a systemic poison would be effective. Cygon-2, Borer Control, or a systemic rose insecticide in granular form might work.

Pay special attention to water schedules. Gloomy May days can be deceiving when it comes to watering needs of our plants.

Neil Presents 13-Video Beginner Series

Online Video Review

13 great videos: Ryan Neil instructs a beginner.

Ryan Neil Bonsai Mirai Portland, Oregan YouTube Bonsai Beginner Series Ranging from 3⁺ to 33 minutes Go to YouTube, search for Bonsai Beginner Series

Ryan put together a series of thirteen short "how to" videos in which he instructs a beginning bonsai student in selecting appropriate material, finding the front, cleaning conifers, etc. The series is definitely worth watching for beginners as well as a great review for the rest of us.

The videos range in length from three-plus minutes to 33 minutes. I did not look at all of them, but I watched enough to want to revisit them all. An upfront disclosure; there are Spanish translations at the bottom of the screen, which didn't bother me.

I personally think Ryan, near Portland, Oregon, and Bjorn Bjorholm in Tennessee are the two top bonsai instructors in the USA today. Two big pluses; they both have studied in Japan and both are fairly young.

Cleaning a deciduous tree (below). Primarily just removing deadwood. You don't need to get rid of masses of foliage to see the branch structure as you would on a conifer.


Determining the front (right). The width at the base as well as root structure are two important deciding factors.





Structural wiring of trunk and main branches off the trunk (left). Ryan says you need about 20% extra wire to use as a lever when wiring near the tip. He suggests 55° – 60° between loops for structural wiring.

Selecting a pot (right). The size and color of the tree and pot, the shape of the tree, size of the root mass as well as other factors are considered. I like the pot that was selected for the deciduous tree.



A Gnarly, Five-Tree Olive Grove with a Path

Editor's Note: At the Conejo Valley Bonsai Society's April 21, 2022 meeting, Marj Branson presented this group planting of five olive trees with a path among them. Here are some details about this bonsai.

I planted my olive grove in February 2021. I got the olive trees from Jim Barrett and had been grooming them for a year and a half prior to then. I had originally planted three trees—however, it did not look right, so I changed it to five. I wanted the trees to look old and gnarly—not like lush green trees. That was the effect I was trying to achieve with the weathered old rocks. The path leads the viewer up a hill to a quiet secluded area.

Book of the Month

"Creating Bonsai by Airlayering" by Andy Walsh, *Bonsai, Journal of The American Bonsai Society*, Volume 36, Number 2 from the Summer of 2002.

For this month's book review I decided to select a random periodical from the "archives." The CVBS library consists of two book boxes; the first box is full of books and the second is full of older periodicals. When I look through these older and mostly out-of-print periodicals, I'm always pleasantly surprised to find an interesting article or two. The art of bonsai evolves slowly, so a 20-year-old article is usually still accurate and relevant.


My random selection for this BOM pulled out *Bonsai*, *Journal of The American Bonsai Society*, Volume 36, Number 2 from the Summer of 2002. In this issue I saw a couple of interesting articles, including one on how to prepare a bonsai for show and another titled "Creating Bonsai by Airlayering" by Andy Walsh. Andy Walsh is the founder of the Bergen Bonsai Club in


New Jersey, has a master's degree in microbiology, and his writings about bonsai biology can be found across many internet sites.

Finding this article was serendipitous because I was just talking to my son about using air layering to jump start his bonsai collection. I explained how to do the air layer (just as Ann Lofquist explained it to me several years ago) but could not adequately explain why air layering works. This article by Andy Walsh explains the how and the why.

In short, air layering physically "prevents carbohydrates, photosynthates and auxin from flowing down the trunk" while still allowing "water, mineral nutrients and cytokinin to flow upward to the leaves." This keeps the leaves alive and establishes an environment that encourages root germination and growth. Figure 11 from the article is shown below and illustrates the overall process. Let me know if you would like to read the article yourself to better understand the detailed microbiology. I will gladly bring the "archives" to a future club meeting.
