Barrett's Bonsai Tips

The November Weather Puzzle: What To Do?

November can be a frustrating month for hobbyists as well as for our trees. Most trees will continue to grow as long as the weather stays balmy with warm nights (above 45 degrees F).

So what to do? If the weather stays warm, we can still repot (pot-to-pot) black pines and most junipers. It would be better to wait until spring, but if you can't and have been waiting for cooler weather, it can be done now using common sense with regard to soil and root removal.

If your maple leaves are still relatively fresh, they might give you some fall color. If the leaves are tired and worn out, think about removing them. Make sure they are destroyed and not left on branches or soil surfaces of the bonsai. If you are planning to remove the

leaves, then spend some time pruning your unwanted twigs, branches, and deadwood.

Check all wire on your trees this month and remove it if it was applied last spring or if it is beginning to scar the bark.

Watch for pests, especially red spider mites on junipers. If the weather

stays warm, you may find aphids

on your crabapples, quince, and other fruiting bonsai. Check for scale on elms.

This month is a good time to restyle junipers and black pines. They will develop their foliage mass quicker in the spring.

CVBS Virtual Event

Our 19th Annual Bonsai Exhibition (Virtual)

The Conejo Valley Bonsai Society's 19th Annual Bonsai Exhibition was, again, a virtual affair. Somewhat smaller than last year's virtual event, ten society members contributed from one to four bonsai photographs each for a total of two dozen displays.

There was a nice mixture of species represented. Junipers were the most common with several species in the show: a couple of Japanese garden junipers (*Juniperus procumbens* 'Nana'), a creeping juniper (*Juniperus horizontalis* 'Prostrata'), one Taiwan juniper (*Juniperus formosana*), and one Shimpaku juniper (*Juniperus chinensis* 'Shimpaku').

Figs and boxwoods were the second largest groups, with three each. All the figs were from Ken Fuentes. He showed one Ficus Burtt Davyi and two willow leaf figs (*Ficus salacaria*). Two of the boxwoods were Japanese (*Buxus microphylla* var. *japonica*), one of uncertain species.

There were two olives (*Olea europae*). Rick Boyer's (page 9) has an impressive nebari while Larry Kimmelman's giant is probably the largest of the bonsai presented in this virtual show (page 11).

The fall season was evident in Marj Branson's Japanese zelkova (*Zelkova serrata*) in winter silhouette (see photo, this page). My Natal plum (*Carissa macrocarpa*) flowers and fruits in the fall; sharp-eyed observers may note two still-green plums on the lower branches (photo at right).

Unique species included a brush cherry (*Syzygium paniculatum*), a rosemary (*Salvia rosmarinus*), a Brazilian raintree (*Pithecellobium tortum*), and an Indian hawthorne (*Rhaphiolepsis indica*), among others.


