President's Message

Talks, Trips, Workshops & Demos By Marj Branson

he Conejo Valley ■ Bonsai Society is developing an exciting schedule of workshops, member-led discussions, field trips, and demonstrations. Both Program Chair Nancy Smeets and Field Trip Chair Damon DuBois are busy lining up activities and working out details.

At our March meeting, Ken Martin will lead a five-minute discussion of how to wire bonsai into a pot. Some other scheduled topics

include fertilizers (time of year, types of trees, amount) and bugs, fungi, and preventive maintenance. Farther down the calendar, we are looking for topics and volunteer leaders for our monthly discussions. Please let me know your interests and what we should add to the list.

Meanwhile, Damon has arranged with Huntington Gardens Bonsai Curator Ted Matson an April 22 behind-thescene tour of the Huntington's bonsai collection. (See pages 2 and 8 for more information.) And Nancy is working out details of two demonstrations, possibly including one on kusamono, the Japanese botanical art of potted wild grasses and flowers. As part of our practice of monthly short discussions, I led off our February meeting with some thoughts on how to trim junipers. I brought in several juniper species for the demonstration. It is important to know when to trim and when to pinch. We all had a good discussion.

Barrett's Bonsai Tips


Let New Growth Harden before Repotting

If you plan to transplant wisteria after Ablooms are gone, don't fertilize for at least one month after repotting. If you have wisteria and do not plan to repot, fertilize right after the blooms are gone. It is said that wisteria require three to four times as much fertilizer as most bonsai. Just make sure the fertilizer you use is slow release.

Fertilize quince, ume, crabapple, and pomegranate this month. Do not fertilize satsuki azaleas until blooms are gone.

If you plan to repot azaleas, you can still trim fairly severely. Azaleas that have not been repotted for two or more years may be repotted this month, especially if the plant is to be heavily pruned. Wash all of the exhausted soil from the roots, making sure that you clean out all of the old soil directly under the base of the tree. Be them dry out.



Several soil mixes are now being used. All provide excellent drainage with the ingredients tending to provide an acid reaction on the pH scale (pH 5 to 6 is recommended by Mr. Richard Ota).

Repotting or potting for the first time:

- Black pine from nursery container to pot or pot-to-pot
- Trident maple from nursery container to pot or pot-to-pot
- Zelkova from nursery container to pot or pot-to-pot

 Beech, hornbeam, juniper, and Atlas cedar may all be potted or repotted now

Most deciduous trees should be in full leaf by now, so wait until the new growth has hardened if you plan to repot maple, elm, hornbeam, and zelkova.

Fertilizers such as cottonseed with bone meal and blood meal may be used. Use four parts cottonseed and one part bone meal to make a good, safe fertilizer for the promotion of blooms and good color. Stop feeding one month before blooms appear.

If your elms, Japanese maples, pomegranates, etc., are leafing out, wait until this new growth hardens before repotting

Look out for wooly aphids on apple, quince, and other plants attractive aphids. Malathion with a little horticultural mixed in should do

the trick. The oil allows the Malathion to stick and penetrate the white fuzz covering the critter. Spray again in about ten days. This treatment will also take

Cheap Shohin plus Japanese Aesthetics


Online Video Review: This month I decided to feature two of my favorite American bonsai artists. One demonstrates how to make a cheap shohin bonsai, the other discusses the evolution of Japanese aesthetics.

Ryan Neil Bonsai Mirai

YouTube: How to Turn Nursery Stock into a Shohin Bonsai Creation

Ryan Neil takes an inexpensive nursery juniper just repotted up into a one-gallon can and converts it into a shohin size bonsai. When selecting this plant, he looked for one with twists and turns in the trunk and a lot of branches down low. He initially was thinking literati but then decided on a shohin with the longer branches jinned. This demo shows us we can take a cheap plant from a nursery and make an acceptable pre-bonsai.

I moved it into a bonsai pot in February 2019 and repotted it again in February 2021. I plan to repot again this winter so I can adjust the location in the pot.

Book of the Month

"Styling and Detail Work of a Collected Juniper" by Todd Schlafer (Bonsai Club of Santa Barbara and Conejo Valley Bonsai Society, July 2021).

This issue's Book of the Month is a DVD titled "Styling and Detail Work of a Collected Juniper." It features Todd Schlafer of First Branch Bonsai. The DVD is a recording from Todd's presentation to the Bonsai Club of Santa Barbara and the Conejo Valley Bonsai Society on July 8, 2021, during the height of the Covid-19 pandemic. Since we weren't meeting in person, both clubs agreed to co-sponsor a short series of demonstrations via Zoom.

In this video, Todd starts with a mature but relatively untamed juniper that had been collected from the wild several years earlier. During this demonstration, he walks us through a previous video that he developed to document how he styled this tree. The resultant discussion and narration of another video is well done and provides even greater insight into the styling process, including cleaning dead and live wood, wiring and bending branches, wiring and fertilizing. It is an informational discussion that you can check out from the CVBS Library. —Mike Blumenberg

CVBS Field Trip

Behind the Scenes Tour of the Huntington Bonsai Collection By Damon DuBois

The Conejo Valley Bonsai Society's Field Trips committee has arranged for a private, behind-the-scenes tour guided by Ted Matson of the massive bonsai collection at the Huntington Library, Art Museum & Botanical Gardens. The tour will include the workshop areas where trees are maintained or prepared for exhibit.


We will spend some time in the courts, but most of the time will be in the nursery where our group will see all the trees that are not on display. That will include many of the larger trees that are rarely shown because of their size. During the tour, Ted will highlight and talk about some select bonsai, and our group will be free to ask questions and explore other areas.

The bonsai nursery and work area is also next to the 320-year-old Shoya House, so our group will get to see that as well.

The tour will not include general access to the Huntington. (Individuals who want to make separate reservations as Huntington Gardens members or visitors may do so on their own. Note that the Huntington requires advanced reservations for weekend visits.)

The tentative date is April 22, 2023, and will be from 10:00 AM - 12:00 Noon, pending confirmation and a final count of club members who wish to attend. There will be an opportunity to sign up at the March CVBS meeting.

Barrett's Bonsai Tips (Continued from page 3) care of regular aphids and spider mites.

Start fine-tuning show trees [for the CVBS annual exhibition or for a niche display]. Trees to be shown should not have large-gauge wire on trunks or visible on large branches. It is, however, permissible to have wire on medium to small branches providing it is neatly applied. Annealed copper or anodized aluminum are preferred wire choices.

If you wish to darken bright copper wire, soak it overnight in Purex tree is returned to its everyday pot.

or diluted muratic acid (swimming pool acid). Wash it with clear water before using.

Start getting rid of moss growing on trunks and base roots. Be careful not to damage rough-bark trees such as black pine and cork bark elm.

Are you planning to change pots before [showing your bonsai]? Do it now so the tree will look settled in its show container. This is a common practice in Japan. The show pot is then stored away after the show and the tree is returned to its everyday pot.
